### Music

This is also true of girls in Y8 and Y9 where a number are really beginning to show their deep interest in music and desire to progress their skills. This has been particularly true with the guitar and ukulele, but also with voice, keyboard and drum-kit.

September also saw our Y10 GCSE Music course begin and the 15 girls



that chose to follow it have made a promising start. As part of this, we had a piano master class and recital given by international concert pianist Richard Meyrick who runs *The Piano Studio in Mayfair*. This was indeed a super event and one that a small number of Y9 pupils also enjoyed.

Our School Choir, RGSC is working very hard towards festive events and of course to the VIAM (Voice in a Million) event at the SSA Stadium, Wembley in March. There are 43 pupils involved with this and we are currently in the process of fundraising to raise money for the coach to transport us there and back. As such, RGSC will be singing at the SavaCentre store on Saturday 13 December (from 3.00 until 5.00pm) and at the local Morrisons store on Wednesday 17 December (from 4.00 to 5.00pm) in order to swell the coffers. We are also promoting an 'Animal' quiz which is available from the Music Department for £1.00 - lots of fun, I promise you!

The most recent transformation of the department is the conversion of the smaller practice room into a **Recording Studio**. This is another project that I'm sure will inspire our girls and I look forward to hearing really super work being recorded. I am extremely keen for pupils to have the opportunity to gain instrumental and vocal tuition in school. **Reading Rock Academy** is currently working with our Y10 pupils and they are able to expand tuition to



the wider school. Instrumental lessons are available for keyboard, guitar (acoustic and electric), bass guitar and drum-kit and would cost £5.00 per lesson, payable half termly i.e. £30.00 per half term. ## BTEC Level 2 Travel and Tourism

'Get On with Hospitality' We were fortunate to be offered a place on the above course for the Level 2 Travel and Tourism students. This course was organised by the Central Berkshire Education Business Partnership. The purpose of the course was to give students the opportunity to experience hands on activities addressing customer service, housekeeping, management and financial management.

The students also had a tour behind the scenes of the hotel. The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience which included identifying and tasting unusual foods, taking part in a silver service relay and having the opportunity to talk to members of staff about their career development.

**'Chessington World of Adventures'** As part of the BTEC Level 2 Travel and Tourism course the students went on a trip to Chessington World of Adventures Park. The students attend a workshop on Customer Service and Human Resources. This provided students with the opportunity to gain further understanding of the customer service provision of a leading visitor attraction which they used as a case study for their coursework. Following the workshop the students were able to enjoy full access to the park for the remainder of the day.

## Cache Level 2 -Cinema Trip

One of the first tasks completed on the Cache course is to plan a trip. This year the students decided upon a trip to the cinema. After choosing a date and time for the trip the next decision was "Which film do we want to see?" Unfortunately the staff did not get to choose and the class chose a horror movie. Even the trailer made Mrs Kelly and Mrs Roberts a little anxious.

We all met on a gloomy Tuesday morning and nervously entered the cinema. The Cache students, loaded up with snacks, were ready ....... we all sat on the edge of our seats and I am sure that lessons were disturbed at Reading Girls' School by Hajar's screams. Surprisingly we all survived the film and even managed to enjoy lunch in Pizza Hut before returning to the NTA.

#### Humanities

To help with their GCSE courses, the Y10 Geography and Leisure & Tourism classes went to **Swanage** for the day.



The geographers were focusing on coastal landforms and processes, while the leisure & tourism group were looking at the area as a tourist destination. Despite some very heavy rain and strong winds, everyone had a good day and learnt a lot for their subject. By far the most entertaining part of the day for the students was the lunch break spent sheltering from the rain in the amusement arcade! The staff preferred to shelter in the fish and chip shop.



On Friday 28 November, eight Year 9 students went to Microsoft, in Thames Valley Park. The girls took part in a competition, which aimed to encourage more females to consider a career in the STEM industry (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths).

The pupils received a warm welcome by the Microsoft staff and were led into Chicago, a cinema-like conference room, which was also occupied by all the other schools competing. Next, they had a very inspiring talk by a computer scientist, Sadia Ahmed. She told them about her journey to her career path and also about her current project, the Rainforest, which looks at how computer logistics can help us make conclusions and predictions about how human globalisation will affect our environment and climate.

After that, the students were briefed on their challenge, to design an app that fitted within their given category. The schools were then split up into different buildings. Reading Girls' was given the category entitled 'Health, Fitness and Sport'. The girls then had to work as a team to create a video that presented their ideas and also showed how inventive they were with the use of the technology all around them. They were supervised by Microsoft staff members and Mr Goff.

After lunch, the girls were given a talk by a group of inventors, who were working on a project named 'Guide Dogs'. This project included the use of technology to help blind people to travel around more easily. This piece of technology is still being modified and has only just attracted media attention.



Then, the girls had the opportunity to ask questions to members of staff and apprentices. After having a jampacked afternoon, the girls had the chance to see some of the latest technology being developed in Microsoft. The girls had great fun participating in a *Just Dance Central* game. Even the teachers joined in!

Finally, it was the prize giving, and although the students worked very hard, they didn't win first prize. "However, it was an enthralling experience and has definitely opened my eyes to how many exciting and interesting STEM job careers there are!" said Victoria Turchyn, 9R. Overall, the girls really enjoyed their time at Microsoft.

# SCIENCE CAFÉ

This year the Science department is running an exciting initiative called the Science Café for pupils at Reading Girls' School. Once a term we will be inviting scientists and professionals from a range of areas such as academia, the health profession and engineering industry to speak to the girls about their experiences studying and working in scientific fields.

This term Mrs Sammie Buzzard from the Meteorology Investigation Department at Reading University came to RGS and shared her experience with a lecture theatre full of excited young scientists.

## Uniform 2015 and Punctuality Drive

When students return to school on Monday 5th January 2015 we are requesting that parents help in ensuring students are in full uniform. We expect **all students** to be wearing the navy blue school jumper with logo, white open-neck blouse, navy blue pleated skirt or formal trousers not skinny trousers - and sturdy black shoes.



Any students who are not in full uniform will be asked to return home to dress appropriately and then return to school.

#### Punctuality

Students are expected to be in their tutor bases by **8.40 am each morning.** Students who arrive after this time will be detained after school that day to make up the time they have missed. I ask parents to support us in this as this requirement for punctuality is a life skill that all employers will expect.

## **Reading Inspires!**



All the Year 9 Students recently attended 'Reading Inspires!' which was held in the beautiful Great Hall of the University of Reading. This event was organised by **Business in the Community** with business volunteers from **Prudential**, **AWE**, **Peter Brett Associates**, **KPMG**, **Galliford Try**, **Fujitsu**, **Centrica**, **Covea Insurance** and also some publishing firms.



Students each had the opportunity to take part in workshops and talk to representatives from six companies during the course of the morning. However the main focus of the event was for them to understand the CBI's definitions of Employability Skills, and how important these skills are within the workplace. These include: Positive Attitude, Self Management, Team Working, Problem Solving, Communication and Literacy, Numeracy and Application of Technology. Transport to and from the event was funded by KPMG and we are grateful for their support.

## Engineering Construction Industry workshop

Year 9 students also attended a workshop on careers in the Engineering Construction Industry. Engineering Construction is the process whereby some things are manufactured, such as biscuit wrappers, trainers, light bulbs and so on. This lively, fun and interactive workshop also talked about different careers paths such as apprenticeships and university.



## Rotary Technology Challenge

A team of Year 8 students and a team of Year 10 students recently took part in a Technology Challenge run by the **Rotary Clubs of Loddon Vale and Maiden Erlegh.** This took place at the **REME Museum at Arborfield**, and there were teams of various age groups from Bulmershe, Forest, Waingels and Piggott schools.

The teams were given dowling, string, board, a battery-operated motor and some other bits and bobs. Their challenge was to make a machine to carry a box across a 'gorge' on a wire. The year 10s also had to make the machine unload the box, and the one Year 12 team that took part from the various schools was also given the challenge to make the machine return across the wire.

The girls worked very hard. They tried out all sorts of ideas and made adjustments to their designs. As well as their scientific knowledge, they had



to use many personal skills teamwork, creative thinking, and communication, as well as perseverance, patience and resilience! Their machines nearly worked but failed in the final test (as did many of the machines created by the other teams).

All the students who attended were given certificates for taking part.

- KPMG are providing mentors for some of our year 11 students to help them over the next few months.
- Central Berkshire Enterprise & Business Partnership will be working with a group of Year 10 students.

came second overall out of sixteen teams the girls' robot won the best design, securing a Lego trophy for

















**Christmas lunch** was served to students over two days in the usual tradition by staff and we saw another special guest handing out presents.
