Recycling

Mobile phones and ink cartridges



Throughout the year we are collecting old unwanted mobile phones and empty printer cartridges. The ink cartridges will be refilled and reused. Unwanted old mobile phones are either sent to developing countries, or urban gold mines for the gold that hides inside them.

Unused books

We are also collecting unwanted books. Any topic or size is welcome. These are sent to schools and libraries in Africa who can make good use of many of them. Books that are tatty or of no use will be pulped to recycle the paper.

Clothing and fabric



We are asking students to collect any old clothing, fabric, curtains, shoes and bags and place them in the special *Bag2School* bags given

out ready for our collection day — Thursday 3 November. The date is just after half term so if your family is having a clear out over the holiday all unwanted clothes etc are put to good use.

These items will be sent to Eastern Europe for reuse or rag recycling. Not only are we raising money, but we are doing our bit for the environment by ensuring that unwanted items go to good use rather than in the bin. Further bags are available from reception or Mrs Eddy. And to make it all the better, the school gets paid for every phone, cartridge, book or unwanted bag of clothing.

Headteacher's Message

We began this academic year on a very positive note as yet again Reading Girls' has achieved another record with its GCSE results. We celebrated our best GCSE results ever - Year 11 students achieved a brilliant 94.5% 5 A* to C grades – a 40% rise on the previous two years. Our English and Maths results also showed a 17% rise over the past two years and we achieved 54% A* to C grades including English and Maths. This continued improved attainment is the result of students, parents and staff working together and I look forward to such collaboration continuing this academic year. As a school we are committed to ensuring all students succeed in both attainment and achievement.

I am very proud of the students and received many positive comments from prospective parents regarding their mature and polite behaviour; they surely are the best ambassadors of the school.

The school, parents and students are in a collaborative partnership and with us all working together the students will make greater progress. Thus I would ask you to support us in ensuring your daughters come to school each day on time and ready for learning, bringing in the correct equipment, wearing the correct uniform and abiding by the code of conduct. The students are extremely smart in their uniforms and I am proud of their appearance. However, may I re-iterate that facial piercings are not allowed and may I ask you to support this rule by encouraging your daughter not to do this.

Our budget is linked to certain percentages. One way we can increase



money coming into the school and buy resources for your daughters is if we can increase the number of parents claiming Free School Meals. If you are on Income Support or Child Benefits, you are eligible to claim a free school meal for your daughter. However, if you are in receipt of Working Tax Credit, you are not entitled. Students are to return to school on Monday 31 October at 8.40 am and go straight to their tutor bases.

Holidays are fine but not in term time

Any absence in term time undermines the continuity of your child's education and reduces her chances of success. Parents and carers are asked to take family holidays during the school holidays. The Headteacher may authorise leave of absence but will consider the reasons for the request, the effect on the continuity of your daughter's learning and her overall attendance. Please be aware that if you take your child out of school for an unauthorised holiday during term time, you may be issued with a fixed penalty notice of £50 per parent for each child. Author Visit



Local author, Mary Hooper, visited Reading Girls' School on the afternoon of Friday 23 September. She talked to

Year 8 and Year 9 students about her books, including the recently published 'Velvet'.

Mary Hooper has written contemporary fiction for all ages, but is perhaps best known for her historical novels. In 2010, 'At the Sign of the Sugared Plum' was selected for the Booked Up scheme. In 2011, 'Fallen Grace' was nominated for the Carnegie Medal and three regional awards.

This was an exciting opportunity for the girls to hear a local author talk about her life and work. Mary's books were also on sale, so students had the

chance to buy copies signed by the author.

Murder Mystery in the History Department

During the school's recent open evening, the History Department put on a 'murder mystery experience'. Students and parents were invited to solve the mystery of why the Tollund Man (a 4th Century BC Danish corpse found in 1950) was killed. Was it murder, suicide or sacrifice?

A skeleton was laid out in the centre of the room with pieces of evidence spread out around it. With excellent assistance from Anu Acharya, Ayesha Khan, Sahara Pandit, Rafia Butt, Yasmin Dickinson and Lois Maxwell, the visitors examined the body and studied the clues. They tightened a noose and iron neck rings, handled a wooden spring goddess and

hands in soup to
find out the
answers. All this
whilst becoming
increasingly
frightened as the
spooky music and

smoke made the classroom into an exact replica of the eerie Danish bog. The visitors did a brilliant job of cracking the mystery and hopefully the history department will find more dead bodies to investigate next year.

Careers Fair

On Thursday 29 September, three coaches of Year 9 students left Reading Girls' School to drive to the Berkshire Conference Centre in the Madejski Stadium complex where the Reading Futures Fair was being held.

The girls are looking at careers as part of their Year 9 coursework prior to choosing their options. The Futures fair gave them a chance to talk to employers and further education providers to find out more about a wide range of careers and the qualifications that are needed.

There were over 80 stands to look at and the wide variety of employers ranged from the army, policy and ambulance service, through accountants, banks and IT providers, to shops, engineers, and the local paper.

The event was organised by Central Berkshire Education Business Partnership (CBEBP) and funded by First Great Western, Network Rail, PepsiCo Ltd, and Tesco. We are extremely grateful for their generosity and support.

that Reading Girls' School is involved with is the Business Class initiative. Developed by Business in the Community as part of their programme to inspire companies to improve their corporate social responsibility, this project encourages companies to engage with secondary schools for a minimum period of three years. It is being implemented locally with the help of CBEBP. As well as working on employability, enterprise and curriculum topics, companies will also be working with management. Reading Girls' School has been linked to the accounting firm KPMG, and we look forward to working with them.
