**Dear Parents and Carers** 

The academic year 2010-11 began with a very positive atmosphere in the school. We celebrated our best GCSE results ever - Year 11 students last year achieved a brilliant 76% 5 A\* to C grades - a 28% rise on the previous year and a 7% rise in 5A\* to C grades including English and Mathematics. We also achieved best attendance the percentage in the whole of Reading. During the last academic year the focus was on improving our results and attendance and this will continue to be our focus this year.

In the third week of term we had an OFSTED monitoring visit who concluded that RGS is indeed a rapidly improving school and has worked hard to ensure that all students are receiving a high quality of education. The OFSTED report is available to read on the RGS website and also on the OFSTED website. The inspectors commented on the good behaviour they witnessed both in lessons and around the school and also described the girls as being eager to learn. With your help and support we wish to embed this thirst for learning within the school.

The school, parents and students are in a collaborative partnership and with us all working together the students will make greater progress. Thus I would ask you to support us in ensuring your daughters come to school each day on time and ready for learning. Bringing in the correct equipment, wearing the correct uniform and abiding by the code of conduct we can only improve further.

#### **Free School Meals**

receive free school meals for your daughter(s). Please do take up this opportunity by asking for a 'Free School Meals' letter from Reception and return it with your evidence.

- ♦ Income Support
- ♦ Income Based Jobseekers Allowance
- ◆ An income related Employment and Support Allowance
- ♦ Support under the Immigration & Asylum Act 1999
- ◆ Child Tax Credit (not Working Tax Credit) and annual income not exceeding £16,190
- ◆ The guarantee element of State **Pension Credit**

This evidence (which must be less than 3 months old) has to be provided three times a year to prove your continued entitlement. Please ensure this is returned to Reception within the first two weeks of the new school year and after the Christmas and Easter breaks. If the evidence is not returned within the first two weeks your daughter's entitlement to a free school meal will be withdrawn. Unfortunately the school is not in a financial position to be able to give free meals to students who are not entitled and we are unable to loan money.

Facebook and the CEOP Centre have joined forces to make young people safer online by launching the new 'ClickCEOP' application. A message from Helen Whittle, Education Officer, Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre, Reading Borough Council.

ClickCEOP is a new 'app' launched on 12 July which links the young user directly from their Facebook profile to help, advice and reporting facilities of the Child Exploitation and Online Protection. (CEOP) Centre - the police agency set up to tackle child abuse.

By adding the app, young people and parents can get support from CEOP on a range of issues - viruses, hacking, dealing with bullying online and they can report someone who is acting inappropriately towards them online. If you have a Facebook profile, app and bookmark the app. If children in your care are on Facebook, get them to search 'ClickCEOP' in Facebook and give them to chance to be one click away from help - if they should ever need it.

Any absence in term time undermines the continuity of your child's education and reduces her chances of success. Parents and carers are asked to take family holidays during the school holidays. The Headteacher may authorise leave of absence but will consider the reasons for the request, the effect on the continuity of your daughter's learning and her overall attendance. Please be aware that if you take your child out of school for an unauthorised holiday during term time, you may be issued with a fixed penalty notice of £50 per parent for each child. 


#### Say Yes!
